- Deliberative, participatory, multi-stakeholder and multi-sector collaboration
- Social purpose, social value for money, and positive impacts



How the Guidelines can be used


Cities can use the Guidelines to operationalise this new paradigm by:

- Investing in multidisciplinary and cross-functional teams founded on honesty, transparency, collaboration and integrity

- Seizing the opportunities provided by digital government, open data and new technologies throughout the full public spending life cycle

Background to this new Working Group:

Build on existing U4SSC deliverables.

Ensure public procurement is fully understood by city administrations and their stakeholders, as a critical, under-leveraged area to promote sustainable development through digital transformation.

Align with the principles contained within and agreed actions resulting from, this year's UN Summit of the Future (22-23 September):

- 'Pact for the Future';
- 'Declaration on Future Generations'; and
- 'Global Digital Compact'.



Approaches of this new Working Group:

We'll develop a 'Model Policy on Intergenerational Procurement' to support city administrations to meet the needs of people and the planet, today and for future generations, through digital transformation.

We anticipate several linkages will be identified that will reinforce the overall objectives of the 'Enabling People-Centred Cities through Digital Transformation' Thematic Group and others.

We'll meet virtually on a monthly basis between October 2024 and August 2025.



Actions of this new Working Group

- Develop a first draft of the 'Model Policy on Intergenerational Procurement' as a 'Primer';
- Identify relevant UN coordinated or supported events to socialise the work, aiming to present the first draft around the mid-year point (i.e. March 2025);
- Demonstrate multi-stakeholder engagements and inputs;
- Present the finalised 'Model Policy on Intergenerational Procurement' around the anniversary of this Working Group (i.e. September 2025); and
- Seek the approval to launch.
